# Letting Bylaws Be Bylaws\*

**Dear Fellow Congregants,** 

It is often said by management/motivational types (I am not kidding when I tell you I that I first heard the following at a Tony Robbins seminar at Harvard Business School) that "the Chinese character for 'crisis' is the same as the one for 'opportunity'"). While this is not true, it certainly sounds cool. In any case, we have an opportunity ahead of us in the election of our next board of trustees and the necessary updating of/compliance with our UUVerdugo bylaws.

Because major sections of our bylaws (a 12-page document everyone should read) were written when UUVerdugo had many more members, they did not provide for the burnout that would inevitably occur when there weren't enough qualified candidates to populate a board. Thus, since the nominating committee has not been able to secure a qualified slate for the 2023/24 fiscal year, we now have an opportunity to mediate burnout and increase efficiency, transparency, and accountability. In order to do this we must have a special meeting prior to our annual meeting, so that solutions for the next board of trustees can be voted in before that board is seated on July 1. Doing it afterward compounds a problem.

Among the proposed solutions for leadership come July 1: a co-president scheme, going without a president, increasing the officers to seven (the board is now operating out of compliance with four members), and a rotating presidency in which three congregants take executive duties for four months at a time, reverting to trustees for the remaining eight months. Along with a Treasurer and a Secretary with augmented reporting duties, this five-member board solution is, in my opinion, the optimal one as it best maintains consistency and accountability and ensures the people in those positions remain efficient and answerable to each other.

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# Letting Bylaws Be Bylaws cont'd

In order to weigh these solutions and solve a problem sooner rather than later/never, according to the bylaws, ten congregants must petition the board of trustees to convene a special meeting at which we will discuss 1.) Bylaw revision and 2.) Board of Trustees structure for the 2023/24 fiscal year that commences July 1, 2023.

I will be sending congregants an email separately. In the meantime, here are some pertinent sections of the bylaws to delight you:

Section I. Annual Meeting. The regular annual meeting of this Church for election of Officers and Trustees and other business shall be held on a date to be determined by the Board of Trustees, provided that it shall be in the month of May or June each year and announced to the membership no later than March 15. Final notice of the annual meeting shall be given in writing to the membership at least twenty (20) days prior to the meeting and shall specify the business to be conducted, as well as the time and place. All items proposed for the agenda shall be presented in writing to the Board of Trustees at least forty-five (45) days prior to the meeting.

Section 2. Special Meetings. Special meetings of the Church may be called by the Board of Trustees and shall be called upon the written request of ten (10) or more voting members of the Church. Notice of special meetings shall be given in writing to the membership at least twenty (20) days prior to the meeting and shall specify the business to be conducted, as well as the time and place. Five (5) members of the Board of Trustees may empower the President to waive the twenty (20) day requirement provided effective notification of the membership is employed.
